A rubric is a scoring tool used to evaluate an assignment, performance, or product, such as essays, research reports, portfolios, works of art, recitals, oral presentations, and group activities. It identifies the primary characteristics (a.k.a. "traits") of the item being rated and describes levels of performance criteria for each characteristic. After drafting a cookie rubric, you will have all the tools you need to develop a rubric for one of your major assignments or outcomes. This latter rubric, in turn, can be uploaded to COM's newly acquired eLumen classroom and assessment management system that is going live this semester.</p>

When an assailant is sprayed with pepper spray, their eyes will water, throat will constrict and they will find it very difficult to breathe, giving time for a victim to escape.</p> <p>After the introduction, participants will go outside and practice using an inert canister against an attacker.
